Through careful drawing and layering, a portrait can convey:

- Depth behind the eyes
- A sense of awareness or ease
- A subtle presence that makes the image feel dimensional and real

This is what gives a portrait its sense of life—even in stillness.

Personality — The Heart of the Portrait

Personality is what transforms a portrait from accurate to meaningful.

Every pet has a distinct way of being:

- Quiet and observant
- Curious and expressive
- Gentle, confident, playful, or steady

My goal is always to understand who your pet is to you, so their character comes through naturally—not exaggerated, not posed, but honest.

When personality is captured, the portrait stops feeling like artwork alone. It feels like your pet sharing the space with you.

A Portrait Isn't Just Artwork

A finished portrait doesn't live in a folder on your phone. It lives in your home—in your hallway, your living room, and in the small moments you pass it every day.

Clients often tell me:

“I didn’t realize how much joy I’d get from seeing it every day.”

That’s the difference between liking a portrait and living with one.
